Support with learning

Personalisation is a big part of the NTU experience.

All our students can customise their course — from what they're studying, to how they're assessed, to the kinds of support they feel they'll most benefit from. It's about providing them with the freedom to plot their own path, and the expertise to help them reach their goals.

To achieve that, NTU has an army of support staff — advisers, administrators, and coaches, all committed to helping our students reach their potential.

Dedicated personal tutors provide one-to-one academic, pastoral, and professional care, and will help your child access any additional support they might need.

CERT mentors — second- and final-year students on the same course as your son or daughter — are also allocated to new students; they'll share their own experiences, helping them get to grips with their studies and surroundings.

We provide dedicated library workshops for our new arrivals too, which cover the essentials of uni-level study — things like research skills, referencing techniques, and how to avoid plagiarism. On top of that, we've developed some useful online services help to ease the transition:



The Student Dashboard

- this award-winning tool helps students manage their learning and stay on track with their studies. By measuring things like lecture attendance and participation, it's a great indicator of how your son or daughter is doing... and sometimes, how they could be doing even better!

NOW – a virtual learning environment that gives our students on- or off-campus access to their timetable, course materials, key resources, assignment-submission portals, and file storage. It's also a great way of keeping in touch with their tutors and coursemates.



Lecture Capture — this digital recording tool helps students to revisit their lectures and review anything they feel they might have missed the first time around.



MyNTU – keep in touch with Nottingham Trent University from anywhere, on or off campus.

Access their timetable on the go, find an available PC, register attendance, check NOW and much more. MyNTU provides them with everything they need in one place and with notifications they'll always be up-to-date.



Support with living

There's no denying that life at university can be an adjustment.

This might be your child's first time living away from home, so we'll do everything we can for their confidence and comfort. Academically, professionally, emotionally, and socially, we've got their back.

We welcome students from a huge range of backgrounds, which is a big part of NTU's identity. That diversity also means we're committed to providing tailored, useful care to every single member of our community. That could be anything from some initial anxiety or homesickness, to a long-term physical or mental-health condition. Paying for university

Course fees, student accommodation and living costs are the main expenses of student life. Your child can apply for a tuition fee loan and maintenance loan.*

A range of grants and bursaries might also be available, depending on their personal circumstances.

Tuition fee loan

This covers the tuition fee charged by the university, and it's available no matter what your household income is. It's paid directly to the university and, if a student is from England or Wales, starts getting repaid once they've graduated and are earning more than the government's repayment threshold.

Maintenance loan

This helps towards rent, bills, and other living costs. The loan is paid into your son or daughter's bank account in three termly instalments. The amount of loan they can get will depend on whether they're living away from home, whether they are entitled to certain benefits, and towards your household income.

Bursaries, scholarships, and other funding

In certain circumstances, extra funding is available to supplement living costs. Make sure you're applying for everything your child is entitled to!



Our campuses



Located in Nottingham and throughout the wider county, our five campuses all have a unique identity and sense of character.

From the bustling City Campus to the stunning countryside estate of Brackenhurst and the self-contained student community at Clifton, they're all defined by amazing facilities and an unbeatable living and learning experience.

These cutting-edge spaces and places have been custom-made to enhance your child's university life – in and outside of lectures.

City Campus (Nottingham city centre)

A place that's big enough to inspire, but compact enough to provide a sense of community; one where our best and proudest traditions sit shoulder to shoulder with new theories, new practice, and new possibilities. It's the same mix of heritage and modernity that sums up Nottingham itself.

But most of all, the City Campus is defined by its diversity. From lawyers, journalists and psychologists to entrepreneurs, artists and architects, the quality of your child's learning will be enriched by the huge range of people and disciplines around them.

Clifton Campus (5 miles from Nottingham city centre)

Clifton is community, convenience, and an ecosystem all of its own, with everything your son or daughter could need in one place. If they're fortunate enough to live and study here, they'll find accommodation that's minutes from lectures; lectures that are next door to some incredible sports and leisure facilities; and a whole host of shops, bars and cafés.

With a community of over 8,000 students, Clifton is the definition of 'campus life' – a place with its own spirit and character, and somewhere your child will love living and learning. Located just to the south of Nottingham city centre, it'll give them the best of both worlds – their own place and space, with one of Britain's great student cities on the doorstep.

Brackenhurst Campus (14 miles from Nottingham city centre)

Located next to the picturesque market town of Southwell, Brackenhurst Campus hosts our courses in animal, rural and environmental sciences. It offers some of the most scenic university accommodation in the UK, and a strong, focused, passionate sense of community. It's also connected to the bright lights of Nottingham by an excellent bus service that runs into the early hours, saving your child plenty of money on late-night taxi fares!

Confetti Nottingham (Nottingham city centre)

Confetti is a nationally renowned creative hub, and a magnet for digital talent and is located just a short hop from our City Campus. You'll be amazed by the facilities our students can access from day one of their course – from media production labs and hi-res cameras, to broadcast-spec TV galleries.

Confetti London (Whitechapel, London)

Opening its doors in 2023 this new specialist centre for digital arts, production and performance will offer a range of courses in London's Whitechapel district.

Mansfield University Hub (13 miles from Nottingham city centre)

We've partnered with Vision West Nottinghamshire College to deliver careerfocused courses, with qualifications including higher national qualifications, and foundation, top-up, and bachelors (honours) degrees. If your son or daughter is looking for alternative higher education, if they're limited by work or care commitments, or if they're simply looking for a taster of university life, this could be their perfect solution.

Staying safe and secure

It's important to us that every single member of our community feels completely safe, and we work closely with our Students' Union, the council, and the local police to ensure that.

24/7 security

Your child will have 24/7 access to our security team, and we'll encourage them to save the number in their phones at induction. It's also included on the back of their student card.

Safe taxi scheme

We've introduced the Safe Taxi Scheme, where any student without cash can quote their NTU ID number to a dedicated phone line, arrange a door-to-door lift home, and then pay later.

Consent workshops

We run mandatory workshops on consent and safety in the first term of each new year, and every NTU student is bound by the rules set out in our Student Charter of personal conduct.

Safe place initiatives

We're also rolling out a new initiative developed in partnership with the Students' Union, where each campus has a designated 'safe place' — an area for students who need help, care, guidance, or breathing space, staffed by our own security team and wardens.

Our city is a big part of the NTU experience.

For the tens of thousands of students who've come to us from across the country (and around the world), this city has accommodated, supported, and inspired them.

Notts facts



Since 2010, Nottingham has received twelve consecutive Purple Flag awards — reiterating the city's reputation for safety, accessibility, and the diversity of its entertainment.



The public transport network here is exceptional. Student discounts are available on our buses and trams, which run into the early hours and provide door-to-door connections between our campuses.



Located immediately off the M1, Nottingham is within a two-hour drive of 75% of England's other towns and cities.



Alongside Prague, Edinburgh, Melbourne and Milan, Nottingham is a UNESCO World City of Literature.



As one of the UK's core cities, Nottingham is home to the region's premiere SMEs and start-ups — providing work experience opportunities on our courses.

Supporting your child's UCAS application

We recommend helping your son or daughter keep track of their key dates and what they need to provide — for us, and for UCAS.

They can apply for up to five different courses different courses in their application. This could be the same course at five different universities, five different courses at the same university, or any other permutation.

Once they've received offers, they'll need to choose a 'firm' one — which is their first choice preference — and an 'insurance' place, just in case they don't meet the stated conditions of their first choice.

UCAS application deadline



The UCAS application deadline is Wednesday 31 January 2024 by 6 pm.

As a parent, guardian or carer, this is where your proofreading

and editing skills can come in particularly handy before it's submitted.

If your child misses the deadline, they might still be able to apply. NTU welcomes applications after the January cut-off, though we can only make offers if places remain available.

UCAS Extra



UCAS Extra opens. This is the next step of the application cycle for students who have no offers from their five choices, or who have declined the offers they've received.

If it's the first time they've applied to university after the January deadline, your son or daughter will need to apply through UCAS and provide a personal statement and reference.

Accepting offers



In early June your child will need to confirm their firm and insurancechoice institutions on UCAS.

Any new applications submitted to UCAS after this date will automatically be considered through Clearing.

Clearing



Clearing opens. This process helps students who haven't yet secured their university place, find and apply for courses. Visit **ntu.ac.uk/clearing** to find out more.

A-level results day



A-level results are published in mid-August. Students can log in to ucas.com to see the outcome of their application(s) — if they've been accepted by their firm choice,

then their place is confirmed.

Welcome to NTU

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Supporting your child on results day

Clear heads make good choices.

We'd advise you to be positive, but practical. Ahead of the big day, encourage your child to have a backup plan in place – whatever their expectations.

Ensure they learn about the Clearing process, too. Preparation is key – and understanding how Clearing works could give them a head-start at a busy time. Visit **ntu.ac.uk/clearing** for more information.

Make sure they've got everything ready and to hand — from their offers, to those key telephone numbers. It's not the day to be hunting around for UCAS log-in details!

Also, try to make sure that they're not on holiday: if any communications are required, universities will need to speak with your child directly. But most of all, respect and support their decisions. Every choice has its merits. A gap year or far-flung university might not be your preferred option, but they're adults – let them make up their own minds, independently and with confidence.

Nerves are natural on results day. You can't control the results they will receive, but you can manage the mood. Help your son or daughter to stay calm and composed — as a parent or carer, it's your most important job in the whole process.

Preparing for university

One of the things we're most frequently asked by parents, carers, and guardians is how to prepare their children for university life - and how to provide the right kind of support from that point onwards.

Confidence really is key. Encourage your child to say 'yes' to the opportunities that will inevitably come their way, because ultimately, uni is about more than just studying for a great qualification. It's about lasting friendships, lifelong memories, and the things your son or daughter will learn about themselves beyond their comfort zone. They'll need your enthusiasm and trust to do that.

Our tips on preparing for university

That's the bigger picture — but what about the first days and weeks, at the very start of the journey? We'd recommend the following:

- Travel light, and don't overdo the packing. Focus on the essentials, like clothes, bedding, toiletries, and IT equipment. They'll never have enough coat hangers, and a few family photos can also prove invaluable in the early days.
- Try to agree a weekly budget ahead of time. Your child is going to be responsible for their own finances, so make sure they arrive with a sense of what's affordable, and what isn't. Independent financial management is a tricky – but crucial – life lesson.
- Eating out is a great way to explore Nottingham, but it can get expensive. Try to factor a few treat meals into their budget, but make sure they also arrive armed with some basic (and cheap) recipes. A little kitchen confidence can go a long way, and it's a great icebreaker.
- Nothing's more exciting than the first weeks of uni. Nottingham is a safe and friendly city, with a population of over 60,000 students. But reiterate the importance of respect for our local communities, which sit shoulder to shoulder with our student residences.
- Most importantly, ensure they're open and honest about their feelings. Any early
 nerves are entirely normal there's no 'right' way of starting uni, and no model to
 follow. Encourage a proper dialogue, and engage with our award-winning support
 services whenever necessary.
