

NTU Global Summer School Course Description

Magazine Journalism

Credit points: 5 (2.5 ECTS)

Duration: 5 days

This course is intended for people who are new to magazine journalism. To benefit from this course should have the required <u>English language skills</u>.

Overview and aims

NTU's Centre for Broadcast and Journalism is an award-winning resources that combines practical training in news journalism on all platforms – newspaper, magazine, mobile and tablet.

On this course you'll learn how to research and write magazine features, including the use of pictures, colour and headlines. You will learn how to interview effectively and write in different styles for different markets.

- have an appreciation of the different styles of writing that editors are looking for
- have the skills to write exciting magazine features that will stand out from the crowd.
