Notes for contributors

Articles should ordinarily be between 4,000 and 12,000 words (exc. footnotes), however, submissions outside of these parameters may be considered if there are objective and persuasive reasons.

Articles submitted must:

- be in the recommended house style for the Nottingham Law Journal ([Nottingham Law Journal Editorial Policy and House Style](#))
- comply with the Nottingham Law Journal Ethics Statement ([Nottingham Law Journal Ethics Statement](#))
- not have been submitted for publication elsewhere;
- include an abstract of their article (less than 300 words);
- include a short biography that demonstrates their legal expertise related to the topic of their submission.

Following submission, if the article is of interest it may be selected to be sent out for peer review. The authors will be notified of the outcome in due course. The editor reserves the right to reject articles that do not complement the existing range of papers or where it is not possible to identify a suitable review team.
