

NTU Global Summer School Course Description

Creative Writing

Credit points: 5 (2.5 ECTS)

Duration: 5 days

You should have the English language requirement of the Summer School.

Overview and aims

Nottingham is a UNESCO City of Literature. It's also the home of Lord Byron and D H Lawrence and more recently Alan Sillitoe and Shane Meadows. It's also rumoured that J M Barrie took inspiration for his lost boys in Peter Pan from the poor children in the city. If you've a passion for writing then where better to come to immerse yourself in literature old and new.

This course will introduce you to writing fiction and creative non-fiction. You will explore narrative structure, characterisation, dialogue and editing, as well as looking at a range of different genres and styles of writing.

You'll be encouraged to be experimental in your writing and to develop skills in critical feedback. The course will:

- encourage you to participate in the practice of writing
- help you to experiment with creativity in your own writing
- allow you to critically reflect on your own writing practice and that of others.
