

Welcome to Nottingham Trent University

This guide will help you find your way around the Clifton Campus, home to the School of Arts and Humanities, Nottingham Institute of Education, and the School of Science and Technology. It is a walking tour of the campus; just follow the red route around the University. Where the line is dotted on the map, it is hidden behind buildings; carry on walking along the path to continue the route. The described tour starts at the Pavilion building at the heart of Clifton Campus. The numbered dots relate to the text around the map and describe the main buildings of the University. While walking around the campus, why not drop into one of the coffee bars for a break, and maybe chat to some current students?

Our Clifton Campus is very typical of a greenfield site, in that all the teaching areas, support services, accommodation, Students' Union and other amenities are together in one place. The campus has recently undergone a significant regeneration programme. An impressive new interdisciplinary STEM Teaching and Engagement Centre, plus further investment in Engineering teaching facilities, have recently been developed.

1 Pavilion and Teaching and Learning building



The Pavilion is the central building for students at Clifton Campus, offering flexible and contemporary study spaces in a relaxing social environment. The Employability team are also based here. Adjoining the Pavilion is the Teaching and Learning building, featuring three lecture theatres and ten flexible meeting rooms set up for modern teaching methods with the latest audio-visual equipment. It also features a covered terrace and glazed facade to match the Pavilion. Staff on the main reception will be happy to answer any questions.

2 Ada Byron King building

This building houses Primary Education courses and contains well-equipped teaching resources. It is also home to the Nottingham Institute of Education office.



3 Interdisciplinary STEM Teaching and Engagement Centre (ISTEC)

The Interdisciplinary STEM Teaching and Engagement Centre (ISTEC), is due for completion in late 2017. This impressive facility is the result of a £5m investment from the government, and will contain state-of-the-art laboratories for teaching. It is where engineering practical and workshop sessions will initially be held.

4 John Clare Lecture Theatre

This building contains lecture theatres for Clifton students.

5 CELS / NSRC building

Our Natural Sciences Research Facility supports and enhances the School of Science and Technology's research in physics, biosciences, chemistry, imaging, materials and sport.

The facility houses laboratories to support these specialist disciplines, together with office space dedicated to researchers and research students.

17 Mary Ann Evans building

The Mary Ann Evans building is the hub for Arts and Humanities students. It houses the School office, language resource centre and media laboratories. It is where the majority of their courses are taught. It also contains Computing and Technology laboratories for the School of Science and Technology students, and is home to the Clifton Global Lounge.



16 DH Lawrence building

This forms part of Clifton's student village, along with the Benenson building, and houses the campus shop. Here you'll also find our main Students' Union reception area – the place to go to access the Student Advice Centre, the JobShop, RAG fundraising, societies, and other Students' Union activities.

15 New Hall – Hall of Residence

This purpose-built residence houses 576 en suite bedrooms in flats, and 151 studio-style rooms. Unfortunately, on unaccompanied tours it is not possible to see a room. 14 The Benenson building (The Point)

The Point houses two bars, a coffee shop, diner, games room, and a nightclub with two dance-floors. Many events are held in The Point, including Clifton's main student night every Friday, as well as poster sales, quiz nights, sports club socials and daytime student activities.



13 The Student Services Centre

This is home to the Student Support Services; Credit Control, Finance and the Sunrise Medical Centre. You are welcome to browse the range of informational literature about the University's support provision for students, including financial support and advice; counselling; transition support; advice for mature students and care leavers; support services for dyslexia and other specific learning difficulties; support for students with mental health difficulties; and support for disabled students. The Wellbeing Centre is also based here.

12 Lionel Robbins building

This is part of the Nottingham Institute of Education. Courses in Childhood Studies, Educations Studies, Joint Honours in Education and Masters courses are taught here.



11 Anthony Nolan building

Our groundbreaking research facility offers a lifeline to thousands of patients with life-threatening illnesses. The facility has been funded by a £1.4m donation from the East Midlands Development Agency, and leads a campaign by Anthony Nolan to bank 50,000 cord blood samples suitable for transplantation and research.

10 Peverell – Hall of Residence

9 Clifton Library

We've recently created a stunning new entrance for Clifton Library. The redevelopment sees the culmination of two years of refurbishment works, which have transformed the library into a bright and spacious place, and can be found next to the very heart of the campus.



6 Rosalind Franklin building

This building houses our Superlab in which up to 200 Chemistry, Bioscience and Forensic students can have lab sessions simultaneously. It is considered to be one of the best teaching labs in the UK.



7 Erasmus Darwin building

This can be identified by the mammoth sculpture outside the main entrance. Science courses are taught in this building. At the rear of the building is the Interdisciplinary Biomedical Research Centre and the John van Geest Cancer Research Centre.

8 Lee Westwood Sports Centre

Our sports centre provides students with a fantastic venue for a variety of sporting and fitness activities. Facilities include a gym, sports hall, dance studio, squash courts and a brand new Tennis Centre, with four tennis courts and spectator seating. Information on sports clubs and fixtures can be found here.

The clubhouse is located behind the Lee Westwood Sports Centre. This new facility serves the 3G football pitch, the hockey pitch, tennis courts and lacrosse pitch, providing changing rooms and a social area.

Travelling to Nottingham Trent University's Clifton Campus

🚗 By car

Nottingham is at the heart of the country, and is well served by the motorway network. The M1 passes close to the west of the city, the A42 / M42 link to the south-west of the city, and the A1(M) to the east of the city. The Clifton Campus is located on the A453 Clifton Lane. When using the M1 for Clifton Campus, exit at Junction 24 and follow the A453 for approximately five miles. From the city centre, follow signs out to the A453 (signposted to Birmingham).

🅑 Car parking

At the Clifton Campus, limited parking is available on site. Enter the campus through the main gate. Contact security at the car park barrier and you will be directed to the car park.

🚌 By bus

During term-time, the NTU Go2Uni 4 runs between the City Campus and Clifton Campus. This service runs from the city centre on Burton Street, near to the Newton building, and passes close to the Broadmarsh Bus Station and railway station and on to Clifton, returning by a similar route. Out of term-time, use the Nottingham City Transport (NCT) service number 1, which picks up at the Old Market Square, Broadmarsh Bus Station and railway station and drops off at the gates of Clifton Campus.
