10 Overview and Aims

Through practical sessions and trips out to areas in and around Nottingham this Course will introduce you to exploring and experiencing the world through photography.

You will explore photographic processes and techniques for capturing and sharing your experience of the world.

11 Course Content

This practical course will introduce you to discovering and experiencing the world through photography. Nottingham and its surrounding areas will be explored visually and historically. Local sites of cultural and visual importance will be visited and photographed. We will explore ways of communicating our experience of these places through making pictures. We will explore a variety techniques and methods for making photographs, and then sequence them to express a personal experience.

- Learn how to edit and sequence your photographs
- Make a short `zine of your work using InDesign
