10 **Overview and Aims**

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This course will take you on a challenging creative journey, from observational drawing, life study and drawing on location to more expressive mark-making techniques and creative approaches. The aim is to enable you to create drawings and collages that demonstrate how you respond to new experiences and the environment around you, and how your time in the UK can be expressed in art.

The course is ideal for students from all disciplines. Beginners and more experienced students will benefit. It is less about final outcomes and more about the journey you are taking.

11 Course Content

At the beginning of the course, you will complete a series of observational drawing projects in the studio and on location around the campus. Classroom activities will be complemented with a visit to the Yorkshire Sculpture Park and the Barbara Hepworth Museum, to explore further the themes of drawing, shape, scale and texture in work by British artists.

You will also have sessions working from the life model, and topics such as proportion, shading, foreshortening and methods of measurement will be studied. You will be encouraged to experiment beyond the boundaries of these conventions.

Throughout the course, practical assignments will be underpinned by theory and art historical references. There will be discussions regarding the importance of drawing throughout history and how it remains relevant today.

As the course progresses will learn how drawing is applied in the design world and the techniques involved in conveying 3D objects and spaces. You will learn about drawing techniques used by professionals and you will be set a short 3D design brief to respond to.

As the course and your work develops you will begin to free your approach to drawing and mark-making using a variety of different tools and materials. You'll be encouraged to experiment and reflect, exploring the fundamentals of energy used in drawing, and the resulting actions and gestures.



Towards the end of the course, you will apply the skills learnt to one or more final pieces that will reflect your personal interests and approach. This work, along with the sketchbooks you will have filled, will add unique content to your portfolio.
