

In 1924 famous Alpinist Hywel Morgan disappeared, apparently while climbing with an unknown partner. Pieces of equipment were found on a sea-cliff and along the coastal path, but no other trace was ever discovered. At the time there were rumours of foul play, but police investigations failed to uncover any concrete evidence. A number of suspects were interviewed, and over the years, various books and documentaries speculated about what really happened to the brilliant young climber, often compared by their contemporaries with George Mallory.

Now, a century after Morgan's disappearance approaches, something unexpected has come to light. A local resident, Dai Wyn Lewis, has come forward with a battered tin chest, entrusted to him by his grandfather Caradog Wyn Lewis.
